STRUCTURE GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The charity is constituted as a Trust giving powers to the trustees from time to time to operate in fulfilment of the objectives. Additional trustees may be appointed by the current trustees.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Through the raising of funds by means of grants and charitable donations, manage the restoration of the Grenoside Reading Room building and preserve its heritage. Trustees manage the day to day operations of the building and garden and promote its heritage to the local and wider community through events and education themed activities.

Following extensive restoration and additional building work Grenoside Reading Room reopened at the end of May 2013. Since reopening, the Reading Room has been, and continues to be, a well used community room.

The trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit in determining their objectives.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

This year the Charity's trustees are pleased to report the ongoing success of the Charity. Roger

Guymer was appointed as a trustee at the Annual General Meeting in February 2015.

In January the final payment was received from the Heritage Lottery Fund, final invoices were paid and the restoration and additional new build project was successfully completed.

Room hire has continued to increase as the year progressed with ad hoc bookings supplementing a good number of regular weekly bookings.

Throughout the year the Reading Room has hosted many varied activities and events including talks, demonstrations, school visits, Heritage days, family parties and birthday parties.

Donations from visitors and supporters of the Reading Room and other fundraising events supplement the income received from room hire.

The Reading Room is open every Monday 11.45 am to 3 pm with light refreshments served.

The Sorby Natural History Society has a collection of their archives on display at the Reading Room.

Grenoside and District Local History Society have produced two exhibitions for the Reading Room. The current exhibition displayed is "The Metal Trades of Grenoside". A new third exhibition "The History of Health in Grenoside and District" has been installed in June 2015. This was again produced by our good friends the Grenoside and District Local History Society.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The receipts and payments are set out on page 3. Room hire receipts and donations are being used to cover ongoing running costs.

Reserves

The charity temporarily had negative free reserves at the year end because of capital spending. The trustees consider that a range of £8,000 to £10,000 is broadly appropriate and continue to work to achieve this. They will continually monitor the status of the reserves to ensure that an adequate level is maintained. Reserves continue to be used, as required, to ensure that the building, furnishings and grounds and kept to a good standard.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

For the Year ended 3 April 2015

1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis, as adjusted by the revaluation of the property, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities (SORP 2005).

Incoming Resources

The charity, being eligible by reason of size, has elected to prepare a Receipts and Payments account. Income is accounted for as it is received and analysed according to activity and source.

Resources Expended

All expenditure is accounted for in the period in which it is paid and is analysed on the basis of activities undertaken.

Restricted Funds

Restricted funds are those which are given for a specific purpose and are not available for the general purposes of the Society.

Property and depreciation

The charity owns the freehold of the Old School Grenoside, now known as Grenoside Reading Room, and a number of other properties and plots of land in the village. Historically these have only had a nominal cost.

On completion of the restoration of the Reading Room, the trustees have decided to revalue the property to recognise the increased asset value.

Depreciation is charged on the Reading Room over 50 years on the straight line basis, but there is no charge in the year because of the revaluation.

Other properties are carried at a nominal £1 in the accounts.

Equipment is depreciated over 3 or 10 years on the straight line basis.
